

Director Notes

Tonight's performance is both the continuation of the Strath Haven Music Department legacy and a chance for these current student musicians to make their own mark setting the standard for years to come. This evening's choral concert celebrates music of welcome, celebration, and wonder. The program begins with Camerata, the largest choral ensemble, performing pieces that create a welcoming space, from the traditional Maori haka "Kua Rongo Mai Koe" to the festive "Wolcum Yole!" and the unifying "All the Way Home." Next, Silvertones, a dedicated group of auditioned singers, explores themes of wonder, featuring a modern take on "Over the Rainbow," Monteverdi's "Sfogava con le stelle," and Elaine Hagenberg's "The Music of Stillness," before concluding with Kile Smith's "The Stars Shine," reflecting joy after struggle. The concert closes with Cantata performing Randall Thompson's Frostiana, a work inspired by Robert Frost's poetry that captures the seasons with a blend of reflective and playful movements, culminating in "Choose Something Like a Star," which encourages focus on greater things in times of uncertainty. This program aims to bring warmth and peace as we approach the holiday season.

The Orchestras continue the "home" theme while performing music somehow connected to the French-speaking people of the world: music by French impressionist Claude Debussy, music by French nationalist Cécile Chaminade, *Lakay* by Christopher Ducasse translating Haitian folk sounds to string orchestra, and music of the *Ballet Russes* in Igor Stravinsky's *Firebird*. The French language connects cultures across oceans and continents, bringing themes of common stars and dreams of home to the fore.

Sit back, relax, and enjoy all that these young musicians have achieved this semester.

The Music

Kua Rongo Mai Koe Ngapo Wehi Born in Waioeka, New Zealand, January, 1934 Died in Gisborne, New Zealand, July 31st, 2016



"Kua Rongo Mai Koe" is a traditional Māori haka that serves as a welcoming chant. The title translates to "You have heard," symbolizing a call to gather and acknowledge one another. Often performed in Māori culture at the beginning of important events or ceremonies, the haka is characterized by its rhythmic and powerful vocal delivery, creating a strong sense of unity and respect. As part of the choral program, this piece invites the audience into a shared experience of connection, reflecting the importance of cultural traditions and the power of music to bring people together.

Wolcum Yole!
Benjamin Britten
Born in Lowestoft, England, November 22nd, 1913
Died in Aldeburgh, England, December 4th, 1976

Benjamin Britten's "Wolcum Yole!" was composed in 1942 as part of his A Ceremony of Carols. The text is based on a medieval English carol, celebrating the arrival of Christmas. The piece is marked by lively rhythms and bright harmonies,



with a rhythmic drive that is typical of Britten's style. "Wolcum Yole!" welcomes the holiday season with exuberant proclamations of "Welcome Yule!" while also demonstrating Britten's ability to blend traditional carol melodies with modern choral techniques. This work is an example of Britten's contribution to the choral repertoire and his reinterpretation of medieval texts for the 20th century.

All The Way Home Sarah Quartel Born in Chatham, Ontario in 1982



"All the Way Home" by Sarah Quartel is a choral work that explores themes of connection, journey, and belonging. The piece, set to a text by the composer, reflects the emotional and physical aspects of returning home and the sense of warmth that accompanies such a journey. Quartel uses lyrical melodies and harmonies to evoke a feeling of movement and continuity, while the vocal textures and dynamic contrasts enhance the emotional depth of the work. "All the Way Home" is a celebration of shared experiences and the comfort found in relationships, making it a poignant piece that resonates with listeners on a universal level.

Over the Rainbow (with Lo, How a Rose) Harold Arlen Born in Buffalo, February 15th, 1905 Died in New York, April 23rd, 1986 Michael Praetorius Born in Creuzburg, Germany, February 15th, 1571 Died in Wolfenbüttel, Germany, February 15th, 1621



Richard Bjella's arrangement of Over the Rainbow and Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming combines two distinct melodies into a unified choral work. Over the Rainbow, composed by Harold Arlen with lyrics by E.Y. Harburg for The Wizard of Oz (1939), is a classic song of longing and hope. Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming, a traditional German carol from the 16th century, is known for its serene and contemplative character. Bjella's arrangement preserves the individuality of each piece while blending their harmonic and melodic elements, creating a work that balances the themes of aspiration and reflection.

Sfogava con le stelle Claudio Monteverdi Born in Cremona, Italy, May 15th, 1567 Died in Venice, November 29th, 1643


Claudio Monteverdi's Sfogava con le stelle is a striking madrigal from his Fourth Book of Madrigals (1603), exemplifying the transition from Renaissance to Baroque musical styles. The text, attributed to Ottavio Rinuccini, depicts a lover lamenting his unrequited love to the stars, with vivid word painting and emotional intensity. Monteverdi's innovative use of dissonance, expressive harmonies, and intricate counterpoint enhances the



dramatic text, showcasing his mastery of text setting and his pivotal role in advancing early Baroque music. This madrigal captures both the celestial beauty of the stars and the depth of human longing, making it a hallmark of Monteverdi's expressive artistry.

The Music of Stillness Elaine Hagenberg Born in 1979

The inspiration for "The Music of Stillness" originated from the poem "There Will Be Rest" by Sara Teasdale, where she describes her journey from loneliness to hope through the hushed beauty of evening. One autumn night, when the weather first turned cold, I was enjoying the midwestern countryside and the entire sky was filled with stars. As the cold air hit my lungs, the expanse of the heavens took my breath away, and this is the music I heard. The music of a dream world under the stars where we can leave our troubles and find this momentary "crystal of peace" and rest. A place where beauty and calm exist, and all else fades away.





The Stars Shine from The Consolation of Apollo Kile Smith

Born in Camden, New Jersey, August 24th, 1956



The seventh movement, *The Stars Shine*, forms a poignant and reflective centerpiece of *The Consolation of Apollo*, a work commissioned by The Crossing under the visionary direction of Donald Nally, with celebrated bass-baritone Eric Owens lending his powerful voice to the premiere. This collaboration highlights the ensemble's commitment to innovative and socially resonant choral music. Interweaving texts from The Consolation of Philosophy by

Boethius and transcripts from the Apollo 8 astronauts' historic 1968 Christmas Eve broadcast, the movement explores themes of clarity and renewal, using the imagery of stars and dawn to symbolize the triumph of true happiness over false hope. This work offers a meditative experience that resonates with the wonder and introspection of gazing at the cosmos.

Frostiana Randall Thompson Born in New York, April 21st, 1899 Died in Cambridge, Massachusetts, July 9th, 1984

Randall Thompson's Frostiana: Seven Country Songs (1959) is a choral suite setting seven poems by Robert Frost, commissioned for the bicentennial celebration of Amherst, Massachusetts. Frost, a



longtime resident of the town, personally approved Thompson's selection of texts, which reflect themes of nature, rural life, and human reflection. Written for mixed chorus and piano, the work includes pieces such as The Road Not Taken, Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening, and Choose Something Like a Star. Each movement showcases Thompson's ability to highlight Frost's poetic imagery through accessible yet expressive musical settings, making Frostiana a staple of American choral repertoire.

Scarf Dance from Callirhoe Cécile Chaminade Born in Paris, August 8th, 1857 Died in Monte Carlo, April 13th, 1944

Cécile Chaminade's **Scarf Dance** (1888) is a lively piano piece (one of more than 200) that showcases her distinctive style, characterized by tuneful melodies, rhythmic vitality, and delicate ornamentation. The



piece features a flowing, swirling melody that evokes the image of a dancer twirling with a scarf, combining elegance with playful energy. While appearing light and accessible, *Scarf Dance* presents technical challenges, including rapid passages and harmonic shifts that require precise execution. Composed during a period of widespread popularity for Chaminade, especially in the United States, the piece reflects her ability to create engaging, expressive music within the framework of late-Romantic French style. Despite facing societal challenges as a female composer, Chaminade's music remains notable for its melodic appeal and technical sophistication.

Lakay

Christopher Ducasse Born in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, 1993

"Lakay" is a Haitian Creole title and translates to "Home" in English.

Being a native Haitian who has spent a lot of years away from my home country, this piece expresses some thoughts and feelings of longing for your home sweet home. Lakay isn't a sad piece; on the contrary, it is pretty exciting and full of energy, which is a representation of Haitian culture, consistently strong, always looking at the bright side, and Happily moving forward in life while honoring and remembering our past.

This composition is based on a Haitian Rhythm called "Yanvalou." Yanvalou is a Rhythm and Dance of Haiti named after its associated movements. Yanvalou is one of the most important rhythms in Haitian folklore; it is sometimes linked to "Knowledge," "Patience," "Strength," and "Healing." Usually played on Three different congas named "Manman (mother)," "Segon (second)," and "Kata," the latter being always played with sticks on the body of a conga. I used one conga in

to play a combination of the "manman" and segon" rhythm and two bongos with sticks for a variation of the "Kata." The beat of the rhythm of Yanvalou is a combination of Triple-Duple time (1-2-3 | 1 2) in this composition, with three eighth-notes forming the triple and two dotted eighth-notes (or eighth-notes Duplet) for the duple.

Girl With the Flaxen Hair Claude Debussy Born in St. Germaine-en-Laye, France, August 22nd, 1862 Died in Paris, March 25th, 1918

Claude Debussy composed The Girl with the Flaxen Hair (La Fille aux Cheveux de Lin) in 1893 as part of his first set of piano preludes, a series that explores impressionistic landscapes through music. The piece is inspired by a poem by the French symbolist poet Leconte de Lisle, which evokes the image of a young woman with golden hair, symbolizing a sense of innocence and beauty. The work is characterized by flowing, lyrical melodies



and subtle harmonic shifts, typical of Debussy's early impressionist style. In 1903, Debussy orchestrated the piece, enhancing its delicate textures and creating a transparent, light atmosphere through the careful interplay of strings, woodwinds, and harp. This orchestral version highlights the work's gentle, nostalgic character, emphasizing its serene mood and lush, impressionistic colors.

Berceuse and Finale from The Firebird Suite Igor Stravinsky Born in St. Petersburg, June 17th, 1882 Died in New York, April 6th, 1971

Igor Stravinsky composed Firebird in 1910 for Sergei Diaghilev's Ballets Russes, and it became one of his most famous early works. The Berceuse and Finale are two key sections from the ballet, which tells the story of a prince who frees a magical Firebird from an evil



sorcerer. The Berceuse (lullaby) is a gentle, lyrical passage in which the Firebird, having helped the prince, falls into a peaceful sleep. The music features a delicate melody, initially played by solo strings, and gradually expands with rich orchestral textures. The Finale marks the dramatic conclusion of the ballet, with the prince's triumph over the sorcerer and the restoration of

peace. It is marked by bold, triumphant brass and vigorous rhythms, reflecting the victory and the renewal of life. Stravinsky's orchestration in both sections is noted for its vivid use of color and its harmonic and rhythmic innovation, establishing Firebird as a key work in 20th-century ballet and orchestral music.
